CARLISLE CHATTER by Lynn Sands

It's December, and our snowbirds are arriving. Welcome back! Our Social Committee has a few events planned for the winter and spring months. Each monthly event is posted near the mailboxes along with a signup sheet. Let's have good turnouts; your participation makes these socials possible. New owners should attend these events. They offer an opportunity to meet and greet your neighbors and make new friends. Our first event will be at our clubhouse restaurant, Mel's Way Bistro, on the Tuesday Prime Rib Special and Karaoke Night, December 12th at 6 pm. Supporting our Clubhouse restaurant is important as it is a community benefit for potential buyers. This helps maintain the value of your condo. Many new owners are remodeling their condos. It appears that hired construction people are unaware of our rules as to where to place your old sinks, refrigerators, toilets, and other large items. They are leaving them in our garbage rooms. It's our owners' responsibility to inform these workers that bulk items are not allowed in our garbage rooms. The garbage trucks do not pick these up. Bulk items must be placed alongside our recyclable bins located on both the east and west sides of our building. Waste Management picks up on Wednesdays. They require a phone call two days in advance of pickup so that their truck is large enough to accommodate these bulk items. Call 561-697-2799 to schedule. In addition, please note that all large cartons placed near these outside bins must be broken up to accommodate the garbage trucks. Let's abide by these rules; they keep the Carlisle looking good.

Our Board posts Carlisle meetings near the mailboxes and emails these meetings and other important information to us. Carlisle's last meeting was held on Tuesday, November 7th. Many items were addressed, including the 2024 budget, roof bridges, and the State Study Review of forthcoming mandatory condo reserves.

Carlisle should have the exact amount of the reserve monies required within the first half of 2024. These reserves will affect our 2025 budget. Our annual meeting will be held in the last week of January 2024. A notice will be sent confirming the exact date and time.

Attending Carlisle meetings is important. Your concerns and suggestions need to be heard. Our 2023 Board will end soon, and 2024 Board applications will be mailed shortly. New owners should consider running for our Board. As our building matures, many issues appear. These issues affect all of us. As a Board member, you will have a vote on our budget and any building problem that may occur. Carlisle needs to hear your voice!

Elevator Update.

We finally have all our elevators working. The combination of lightning strikes to A and C buildings and a shortage of semiconductor chips caused the repair delay. Computer chips are technically called semiconductors. Intel Corporation is a large computer chip user and producer. Intel's CEO, Pat Gelsinger, now expects the semiconductor industry to suffer supply shortages until 2024. The CEO told CNBC the extended timeline for the chip crunch is now due to a lack of manufacturing equipment. Other industry leaders and financial firms are all predicting the same shortages.

We will be better protected next time lightning strikes hit our buildings. Board members are exploring solutions to protect our elevators. The most recommended is to install a three-phase Lightning Suppressor to the power supply of each elevator. This is estimated to cost about \$2500.00 for all three buildings combined. When lightning strikes next year, we will be ready.

Enjoy celebrating Christmas, Chanukah, or Kwanzaa for 2023.

On New Year's Eve, let's promise to keep our 2024 resolutions and make them real. Have a Happy New Year 2024.

Use gel ink pens if you are writing checks. This ink cannot be "washed" by scammers.

Honest organizations won't call or ask for personal information like your Social Security number, bank account, or credit card numbers. Never return a call to a number they gave you or click on any links in a text or email.

A reminder that we can always use additional volunteers. Training and a uniform shirt are provided. Only three hours per week are required for patrol and one hour per month for a Unit meeting. Please call Jeff or Deb if you are interested or have any questions.

Come join us on Wednesday, December 13th, to discuss this book and discover our next selection! We welcome any good book ideas.





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
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POINCIANA PLATES by Toni Mirobelli

Holiday season is here and time for gatherings with family and friends. Try this easy and delicious recipe for PECAN PIE BARS. They would be great for cookie exchanges, card parties. and gifts for neighbors.



INGREDIENTS Cinnamon shortbread crust:

2 sticks (one cup) unsalted butter, softened 3/4 cup light brown sugar

2 ½ cups flour

1 tbsp cinnamon

1 tsp salt

Pecan Pie filling:

1 stick (1/2 cup) unsalted butter

1 cup light brown sugar

1/3 cup honey

3 tbsp heavy cream

1 tsp vanilla

2 ½ cups chopped pecans

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 350°. In a large mixing bowl, cream together butter and brown sugar. Add in flour, cinnamon and salt and beat till it is a crumble mixture. In a 9 x 9 baking dish lined with parchment paper, press down the shortbread crust evenly and bake for 15 minutes. When crust is done baking, remove from oven and set aside.

While shortbread crust is baking, make the pecan pie filling. Melt butter in a medium saucepan or skillet, add in brown sugar, honey, heavy cream, and vanilla. Stir for a couple minutes on medium heat and add in the chopped pecans. Stir for another minute and pour the pecan pie filling over baked crust. Put back in oven for another 15-20 minutes to finish it

Remove from oven and let cool for about 45 minutes. Slice and enjoy plain, or with whipped cream or vanilla ice cream

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

Have you heard? Pickleball has arrived at Poinciana. Pickleball is the fastest-growing sport in the US. Pickleball is played on a court that is 20'x40', with a paddle that weighs no more than 8oz, that is larger than a ping pong paddle and smaller than a racquetball paddle. The ball is made of plastic and is about the size of a baseball with 40 small holes. Most people play doubles, but you can play singles.

The game is easy to learn, all aspects are social, and it is over when one team gets 11 points. ALL ages and people with various physical abilities can play. It is not uncommon to have players with new knees, shoulders, and hips playing four to five times per week.

POINCIANA TENNIS By Douglas Adams

HAPPY HOLIDAYS!

Hoping everyone had a great Thanksgiving with family and friends and much more of the same good times over the Christmas and New Year holidays. I bet a couple of people's New Year's resolutions will center around getting into better shape and playing much more tennis. Those are two good resolutions to make as we progress into what should shape up to be a very exciting 2024. It is also nice to see a few more people hitting the courts during November and enjoying some good tennis. Welcome back, everyone.

THE SMASHING DEVELOPMENT OF THE TENNIS RACKET (OR RACQUET)

- 1. Wooden Rackets: Used in the 60s but proved to be very heavy and needed a press to keep the racket from warping. Steel Rackets: Jimmy Connors used the famous Wilson T2000 steel racket to a devastating effect in the 1974 Wimbledon final against Ken Rosewell, who used a wooden racket. 6-1,6-1,6-4.
- 2. Graphite Rackets: Arthur Ashe used the first 100% graphite racket during his legendary victory over rival Jimmy Connors in the 1975 championship at Wimbledon. McEnroe switched to graphite in 1983, officially spelling the end of the wood racquet era.
- **3. Aluminum Rackets:** In 1976, Howard Head, then working with Prince brand, introduced the first oversized aluminum racket to gain widespread popularity, allowing for a mixture of power and control.
- **4. Titanium/Hypercarbon Rackets:** The Head TiS6 was first released in 1996. It's still one of the most popular rackets on the market today, offering extra racket length, a larger head size, and a sweet spot with a lightweight frame and head-heavy balance.
- **5. Graphene Rackets:** Introduced in 2013, graphene is one of the strongest materials known. It's 40x stronger than a diamond and 300x stronger than A36 structural steel, which makes it extremely difficult and expensive to manufacture. By strategically placing graphene and saving weight, the racket can generate more kinetic energy during the shot, providing more power and less effort in the swing.

I hope you all enjoyed a little history and remembering all the different tennis rackets we have used over the years. What's next? We will see.

MILLION DOLLAR TEAR-DOWNS

Do you enjoy watching the Home and Gardens TV shows? Do you especially like the home renovation shows like the Joana and Chip Gaines Fixer Upper Show from Waco, Texas? Their show is among the most popular. The theme is always taking the most dilapidated ranch-style home they can find, signing a contract with a potential buyer, and after improvements with carpentry, plumbing, and electric work, transforming this wreck into a "Sleeping Beauty." Of course, with the improvements, the property value has risen substantially, hopefully covering the renovation costs.

Popular TV shows also feature Million Dollar Mansions in prime locations like Beverly Hills, Malibu, Miami, and Manhattan. Interesting, I've always thought, but not really much of a family home feeling to them. Rather, it is more of a museum feel with all the excessive square footage. Bob Hope once kept such a large mansion in Palm Springs for the sole purpose of hosting large dinners, banquets, and entertaining large groups of people during his annual Palm Springs Golf Classic. Bob and his wife lived in a modest two-bedroom home in this desert town.

Aside from all the construction contractors and real estate businesses, there are a few select people who work in this field on a grand scale. There are many examples in our local area along the ocean. If you take a short drive along the A1A, you will see examples of very expensive homes being torn down and replaced with equally large and expensive mansions with more modern updates. These will include bowling alleys, a movie screening room, game rooms, fitness rooms with saunas, pools, tennis courts, and often an adjacent guest home for visitors. And, of course, the nautical families who demand an adjacent marina for their yacht. Many people prefer a parking space in the back yard to tie up their yacht more conveniently to the home.

Russ Limbaugh, a conservative radio host, lived and worked at his Palm Beach home at 1495 North Ocean Blvd. until he died in 2017. He bought this mansion in 1998 for 3.4 million dollars. The home has 24,000 square feet of space, including 13 bedrooms, 12 baths, a two-story library, four guest homes, a pool, and a putting green. Mr. Limbaugh was especially proud of a salon modeled after a room in Versailles. France. He also commissioned a huge chandelier that is a replica of one in the Plaza Hotel in New York.

In June of 2023, the home was purchased for 155 million dollars by Mr. William Lauder. He is the CEO of the Estee Lauder Cosmetics Co. His personal net worth exceeds two billion dollars. Mr. Lauder has homes in Westchester, NY, Aspen, Co., and Palm Beach, FL. He is presently demolishing the entire Limbaugh home. He has stated that the entire estate needs to be updated and modernized.



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


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
